# Pachaiyappa Mudaliar THE GREAT PHILANTHROPIST [1754 -1794]

Our College is a unit of Pachaiyappa's Charities. It will be of immense interest to know about Pachaiyappa, the father of the Charities.

Pachaiyappa Mudaliar born in 1754 in Periapalayam, some forty miles to the northeast of Kanchipuram. His father Viswanatha Mudaliar, a native of Kanchipuram, had died few months earlier to his birth and leaving his family in distress. When Pachaiyappa was five years of age, his mother took him to Madras along with his two sisters and lived in a small house in Swamy Maistry Street. There she sought the protection of one Mr. Narayana Pillai, a wealthy Dubash in the service of the Powneys, influential English family merchant. Narayana Pillai with his characteristic generosity, treated



her as his own sister and educated young Pachaiyappa in account keeping, correspondence and the rudiments of the English language.

Pachaiyappa quickly learnt English and was all set ready for business. He first became a small scale agent of goods imported by the English merchants of Madras and also purchased supplies for export too. Mr. Narayana Pillai got him appointed as a Dubash under one Mr. Nicholas, a travelling merchant in Tamil Nadu Districts. In this capacity, he travelled widely in the south and made some money. Even in those early years he was deeply religious minded. In 1774, when he was only twenty he built the Kalyana mandapam of the Ekambareswarar temple at Kanchipuram and was responsible for two sacred images to be installed in that temple. He had the Kumbabishekam celebration performed on a grand scale.

In 1776, Pachaiyappa extended his business transactions in Chengleput District and became the most successful negotiator of loans. He undertook to pay the East India Company, in cash the land tax due to them from several groups of villages. He also transacted agency business between the English merchants and the officials of the court of the Nawab of Carnatic and earned the gratitude of both the parties. Soon after, he became the Senior Dubash of Mr.J. Sullivan, a member of the Civil Service of the East India Company who was appointed as British Political Agent at the Durbar of the Carnatic Nawab. In 1783 when Mr. Sullivan became the Chief Civil Administrator in Trichy, Pachaiyappa Mudaliar was appointed as his assistant to provide the necessary supplies to the army. Pachaiyappa's earnestness of purpose, persuasive power, capacity for organisation and the success that followed his work won him appreciation of the authorities.

Shortly after this, Pachaiyappa entered the service of the Rajah of Tanjore. The Rajah had found it hard to pay his annual tribute

regularly in one uniform coinage. Pachaiyappa acted as an agent for making remittances of the Rajah's annual tribute to Madras in regular instalments and received a commission of 10 to 20% on the sums remitted. He also successfully negotiated the terms of the peshkash of several polygars of the southern country subject to the Nawab of Carnatic. In these ways he amassed a handsome fortune of about twenty lakhs of Rupees and built a spacious house for himself at Komaleswaranpet named after him. In 1787, after Amar Singh ascended the throne of Tanjore. Sir Archibald Campbell, the Governor of Madras appointed Pachaiyappa Mudaliar to assist Mr. William Petric, Commissioner for the realization of the revenues of Tanjore. Pachaiyappa had to lend a large sum of money to the Rajah to enable him to pay his arrears of tribute to the East India company. After the necessary arrangements were made for regular remittance of the annual tribute from Tanjore, Mr. Petric returned to Madras, while Pachaiyappa continued to stay on at the Rajah's court maintaining a high style of living with all the dignity attached to his position of importance.

His position and prestige at the court of Tanjore evoked the envy of the European residents of Tanjore, who complained to the Madras Government that some money- lenders and Pachaiyappa, were lending money to the Rajah, at exorbitant rates of interest and were thus encouraging him to indulge in extravagant expenditure and that their removal from Tanjore would benefit both the people and their Prince. In this connection Pachaiyappa had to go over to Madras to insist on the continual of his own position at the court of Tanjore and how his removal would be in contravention of Sir Archibald Campbell's special order of appointment. An investigation followed and Pachaiyappa was completely exonerated in 1791.

It was during his stay at Madras in 1791 that Pachaiyappa made his endowments to the Sri Sabhanayaka shrine at Chidamabaram.

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He arranged for embellishment of the inner sanctum and for the renovation of the superstructure of the east gopuram. In the gateway of the tower are still to be seen the images of Pachaiyappa and his sister Subbammal. He also made a gift of a large number of silver vessels used in the daily worship of the Deity and several ornaments of inestimable value. He provided a new Car for Deity and constructed a mandapam for it and instituted a new annual Brahmotsavam festival known as Ani Tirumanjanam, for the observance of which he later made provision in his Will.

Pachaiyappa returned to Tanjore in 1792 and resumed his duties and also carried on his banking business. Pachaiyappa had no sons. He had first married his sister's daughter. As he had no child by her, he married for the second time when he was residing at Tanjore by whom he had a daughter. But his health had failed and he was then an ailing man. When his illness, became rather serious, he proceeded to Kumbakonam for treatment and during his short stay there, he completed the construction of a choultry which he had begun sometime before. It was at Kumbakonam on 22<sup>nd</sup> March, 1794, that he drew up his famous Will "dedicating with full knowledge and hearty resignation of all his wealth, in the absence of any male issue, to the sacred service of Siva, Vishnu and to certain charities at various temples and places of pilgrimage, to the erection of religious edifices, to bounties to the poor, to seminaries of Sanskrit learning and to other objects of general benevolence. " On the 24th March he sent an autograph letter to his old Patron Narayana pillai saying that his end was near and requesting him to settle all his affairs including prompt payment of every pie due from him to others. He then proceeded to Tiruvaiyar, a sacred place to the northwest of Tanjore and there breathed his last on the 31st March, 1794. He was only forty when he died. The sacred places which immediately benefited by his bequests are Chidambaram, Sirkazhi, Thiruvidaimarudur, Kumbakonam, Thiruvaiyar, Jambukeswaram, Srirangam, Tanjore,

Thiruvottiyur, Madurai, Rameswaram, Kanchipuram, Thiruvarur, Thiruvannamalai, Triplicane and even the distant Benares.

Pachaiyappa Mudaliar was among the foremost Dubashis of his time. He was simple, kind-hearted and God- fearing man, ever inclined to pity the poor and used his money and influence for their relief. He kept a large establishment for dispensing hospitality. He was of a fair complexion with broad forehead and bright intelligent eyes. In appearance and dress he was simple, attractive and dignified. His popularity, wherever he went, was amazing. His name was on everybody's lips on account of his wide sympathy and benevolent charities. His was the remarkable career of a self- made man, who though born and brought up in poverty, rose by his own force of character and genius to be the richest man of his time but who finally gave away all his riches for the service of God and humanity.

In those days 'Wills' were almost unknown and their validity was scarcely recognised. The consequence was that for many years successive executors neglected the provisions of Pachaiyappa's Will and misappropriated the funds therein settled. Fortunately, the matter came to the notice of Sir Herbert Crompton, the then Advocate-General who there upon filed information in the Supreme Court and obtained a decree against the person finally liable for the performance of the charities and also for an account of the funds with accumulated interest, amounting to many lakhs of Rupees. However, the person against whom the decree was passed could only pay small portion of his liabilities. Thiru George Norton, the next Advocate-General succeeded in recovering a large quantity of jewels and thereby realising in respect of the claim a total sum of about eight lakhs of Rupees. In a further decree passed in 1841 prepared a scheme whereby, in duo harmony with the provisions of the Will and without touching upon any specific religious or benevolent bequests therein mentioned, it was directed that all accumulation,

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beyond one lakh of pagodas (four and a half lakhs of Rupees) should be devoted to educational establishments in various parts of the Presidency, and particularly in the city of Madras. The control of these endowments became vested by law in the Board of Revenue which, under instructions from Lord Elphinstone's Government embodied the Scheme of the Supreme Court in a kind of Letter Patent and created a body of Hindu Trustees to administer the whole and carry out the benevolent intentions of the testator.

A school was established in the town of Madras in January, 1842 under the name of Pachaiyappa's Central Institution for the purpose of imparting gratuitous education to the poorer classes of the Hindu Community. This school became very popular and it had developed into the present Pachaiyappa's College, Madras.

The usefulness of Pachaiyappa's benefaction has been augmented by the generosity of enlightened members of the Hindu Community who put the Trustees in-Charge of large funds to be utilised for educational purposes. Some of those benefactors were Ami Govindu Naicker, P. T. Lee Chengal- Naicker, Oleti Ranganayaki Ammal, Chellammal and Kandaswami Naidu.

The late Thiru C. Kandaswami Naidu of Aminjikarai, Madras had made the Trustees residuary beneficiaries of his vast estate. In the year 1967, two Colleges were started in his name, one at Cuddalore for Women and another one at Madras for Men.

At present the charities manage six colleges of which three are for women, and a number of schools catering education to thousands of students in the cities of Madras, Kanchipuram, Cuddalore and Chidambaram. All these developments have augmented the usefulness of these institutions which have filled a very large and laudable place in the cultural life of South India for over a century.

# Condavaru Kandaswami Naidu Garu OUR BENEVOLENT FOUNDER



Intensely religious and God-fearing, Kandaswami Naidu was born in the year 1885 in Kalvoi Village near Thirupporur in Chingleput District. Though a Vaishnavite by birth, he was named after the presiding deity of the place, Lord Kandaswami.

Driven by strained circumstances Lakshmiah Naidu had left Kalvoi Village with their nine years old Kandaswami and three more children and reached Chetpet in Madras city around the year 1894, accompanied by some of his relatives and members of the community. Lakshmiah used to go to the Revu (as the Harbour was then called) where construction work was in progress and earned a little by working as a brick layer. Being very poor, Lakshmiah could not think of sending his son and daughters to any regular school. Kandaswami invariably followed his father to the Revu and supplemented his father's meagre income. After his return from work, Kandaswami attended the school run by one Rangaswami Naicker, popularly as 'nondi vathiar' and learnt to read and write Telugu and Tamil. As an apprentice of Maistry Varadarajulu, he learnt ornamental and relief work in

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Masonry. Unfortunately, the demise of his father at that time, turned Kandaswami, his brother Venkatesan and two sisters, Chinnamma and Chenganiamma helpless orphans.

The burden of running the family fell on Kandaswami who was then in his early teens. None worked harder or lived more temperately than he did. Scorning delights and living hard laborious days, he pursued a career of industry. This early encounter with difficulty and adverse circumstances, proved to be lifting indispensable living condition for his later success. Thiru Calavala Cunnan Chetty, a wealthy businessman of Madras was then constructing godowns near the Harbour. Kandaswami sought employment there as a manual labourer at 11/2 -annas a day. Necessity drove young Kandaswami to learn brick laying and plastering works more quickly and more efficiently than others. This he did while some of the structures of St. George Orphanage at Chetput were being put up. Within a short time, he established himself as a maistry under contractor by name Ramanuja Ayyar of Purasawalkam. He remained under his service for about seven to eight years and attempted to perfect himself by work and more work and carved out for himself an honorable competency and solid reputation for good workmanship.

A fortunate circumstance at this time gave a new turn and a fillip to his career. He entered service under Namberumal Chetty, a leading contractor. It was not, however, accident that helped Kandaswami but purposeful and persistent industry. If there had been accidents, they were carefully cultivated opportunities. Every step in his career was won by honest work, patience, perseverence and self-reliance amidst trials and difficulties. His sound understanding and quick perception soon suggested to him the possibilities of an independent career. With the small savings which he had or with the money which his father-in-law was said to have given him, he started brick kiln at Koyambedu near Madras and began manufacturing country bricks. With the permission of Namberumal Chetty, he took up small contracts and quickly established himself as an independent

contractor, and one such was the excavation of earth for putting up the Pachaiyappa's Hostel Building at Chetput.

Soon, his power of organising labour, his efficiency, integrity and promptitude of action won for him recognition as a master builder and he was enlisted as a P.W.D. contractor and was assigned the construction of a number of government buildings. He switched on to the manufacture of chamber bricks in the kiln at Koyambedu. This fetched him good profits and his income steadily rose. Through his great and sustained efforts Thiru Kandaswami Naidu amassed a lot of wealth and acquired several properties. He constructed on his own seven bungalows in Harrington Road, Chetput and another at 19, Subbaraya Gramini Street which became his permanent residence afterwards, besides a number of smaller houses for middle and lower income groups of people. He purchased a block of 21 houses in Sait Colony, Egmore. In addition, he purchased valuable house sites to the extent of about 85 grounds in Chetput and lands and gardens to the extent of nearly 160 acres in Koodal, Medavakkam, Maduravoyal, Nerkundram and Ayanambakkam villages. For sometime, he acquired the Zamindari rights of Perumbedu Village, which he sold away to Sunampet Zamindar.

In 1944 at the age of 59, Thiru Naidu fell ill. In July of the same year, he settled some of his properties on his three minor daughters. He was then contemplating as to how best he could utilise the rest of his vast estate. His health deteriorated and in May 1948, he fell seriously ill. On the suggestion of some of his best friends and admirers among whom was Thiru K. Venkataswami Naidu, B.A., B.L., the then Trustee of Pachaiyappa's Charities, he caused his last Will and Testament to be drafted by his advocates Pais Lobo and Alvares of 113, Armenian Street, Madras and signed it on the 21<sup>st</sup> May, 1948 in the presence of Thiru A. K. Muthuswami, Advocate and Thiru K. Venkataswami Naidu. Two days later at about 9 pm. on Sunday the 23<sup>rd</sup> May 1948 in the presence of a host of relatives and friends, Thiru Kandaswami Naidu breathed his last. He was

then 63 years. Under the will late C. Kandaswami Naidu bequeathed and endowed the residue of his vast estate, after express legacies to the charities of Pachaiyappa directing the Board of Trustee to " utilise the said amount according to the objects and provisions of the said Trust for the upkeep and maintenance and development of the institution". The board was also empowered to make any endowment in his name. The official Trustee was made the executor of the Will with full powers to sell and dispose the properties for the purposes stated in the Will. The Official Trustee took charge of the estate on the testator's death and obtained probate of the Will. Since then he has been administering the estate, valued at several lakhs of Rupees. In the course of nearly 20 years, the Official Trustee has realised about Rs. 14 lakhs by way of sale proceeds of certain properties (notably seven houses in Harrington Road) which were not remunerative and by way of income from the other immovable properties.

When Dr. A. Venugopal, M.S., F.R.C.S.. was the President of the Trust Board of the Pachaiyappa's Charities, as the legatees under the Will with the laudable intention of fulfilling the wishes of the benevolent testator and to perpetuate his name, resolved on 25th April, 1967 to create an endowment in the name of the testator by starting two Colleges, one for Men at Madras and the other for Women at Cuddalore from the academic year 1967-68. Towards this end the Trustees moved the High Court on the 27th April, 1967 for the issue of appropriate directions to the Official Trustee for the diversion of funds necessary for starting of the two colleges. The Hon'ble Justice Thiru T. Ramaprasada Rao, in his judgement delivered on the 4th May, 1967, allowed the application and directed the Official Trustee to offer security to the University for the sum of Rs. Four lakhs and also to advance a loan of six lakhs for the construction of buildings, etc. of the proposed Colleges. The loan thus paid has been made recoverable from the surplus income accrued from the estate payable to the Trustees of Pachaiyappa's Charities.

#### 17. THE COLLEGE

- The executive management of C. Kandaswami Naidu College for Men, Madras, shall, subject to the general control of the Committee of the Management of Pachaiyappa's Trust, Madras, be vested in the Principal of the College, assisted by a College Council.
- The college council of C. Kandaswami Naidu College for Men, Madras, shall consist of the Principal, the Heads of Departments, a member elected by the Junior members of the staff and a member of the Committee of the management of Pachaiyappa's Trust to be elected annually by that body.
- 3. The following subjects shall come within the purview of the College Council:
  - (i) Formulation of Courses of Study
  - (II) Determination and Distribution of hours of work
  - (iii) Selection of Text books
  - (iv) Holding of Examinations
  - (v) Promotions
  - (vi) Award of prizes and scholarships
  - (vii) Equipment of the Library and Laboratories
  - (viii) Conduct of the Annual Sports and College Day
- 4. The principal shall ordinarily be bound by the majority opinion of the college council on all these matters, If, however, there should arise any occasion when he has to differ from such opinion, he shall then refer the matter to the Pachaiyappa's Trust for the final decision.
- In the event of the Principal overruling the opinion of the council, he shall, before addressing the Pachaiyappa's Trust on the matter, inform the members of the council of the reasons he proposes to address,

- so as to give them an opportunity of recording their views on the subject.
- 6. The College Council shall, as a rule, be consulted by the Pachaiyappa's Trust with regard to all proposed changes in the staff, scope and policy of the college and such changes shall not ordinarily be made if disapproved by a majority of the Council including the Principal
- 7. When Principalship or any other post in the College is about to fall vacant or falls vacant, the college council shall immediately proceed to consider the measures to be adopted for filling up the vacancy and shall report the same to the Pachaiyappa's Trust as early as possible for their orders. The Principal in consultation with the Chairman of the Trust may temporarily fill up the vacancies except that of the Principal, for a period not exceeding three months provided that the temporary arrangements made do not entail increased expenditure and are duly reported to the Committee of Management of Pachaiyappa's Trust.
- 8. Whenever permanent vacancies arise in the college, the Principal in consultation with the chairman of the Pachiayappa's trust shall examine the qualification and general fitness of candidates for all such posts except that of the Principal and record his opinion theron and shall recommend the candidate or candidates whom he considers best qualified fo approval of the Pachaiyappa's Trust.
- The budget of the College for each academic year shall be drawn by the College Council and be submitted to the Committee of management of Pachaiyappa's Trust for approval before the first March of the preceding year.
- 10. The members of the college council shall have access at any time, when the college office is usually open, to the records and correspondence of the office except such papers as may be of a confidential character.
- 11. There shall at least be four meetings of the council in a year. Special meetings of the council can be held at the request of the Principal or any two of the members of the council.
- 12. A majority of the members of the college council for the time being shall form the quorum for its meetings.

- 13. The Principal of the college shall be the chairman of the college council and shall preside over the meetings. In his absence, the members present shall elect a chairman.
- 14. The College Council shall regulate the procedure to be adopted with regard to the summoning of its meetings and the conduct of business by circulation of papers or otherwise.
- 15. All questions arising in the college council shall be decided by a majority of votes. In the event of the votes including that of the chairman being equally divided, the chairman shall have a casting vote. The fact that the question was decided by the chairman's casting vote shall be noted in the minutes.
- 16. Copies of the minutes of all the proceedings of the college council shall be submitted to the Pachiayappa's trust within a fortnight after they are recorded.
- 17. The College council shall elect one of its members, other than the Principal, to be its Secretary to hold office usually for a year and eligible for re-election. The duties of the secretary shall be prescribed from time-to-time by the council
- 18. As regards the students of the college, the Principal shall have exclusive control in matters of discipline and punishment and the council shall not be entitled to interfere therein. In cases of expulsion, however, the Principal may take its advice.
- 19. As regards the members of the teaching staff of the colle ge, the council shall not be at liberty to interfere in matters of discipline and punishment. Should the Principal be of opinion that any member of the teaching staff ought to be fined, suspended or otherwise dealt with, he shall report the case to the Pachiayappa's trust and act upon their orders.
- 20. The appointment and control of the clerical, ministerial and menial staff of the College shall be vested in the Principal, but an appeal shall be made lie to the Pachaiyappa's Trust against any order or suspension of dismissal by the Principal.

# 18. RULES OF

- Candidates for admission to the B.A., B.Sc., & B.Com., Degree courses must have passed the Higher Secondary Examination of Tamil Nadu with appropriate subjects or any of the equivalent examinations recognised by the University of Madras.
- 2. All candidates for admission must submit:
  - (a) The prescribed Transfer Certifcate from the school or college which they have last attended and which should set forth (i) the name of the student in full (ii) the date of birth as entered in the admission register
  - (iii) the date of admission and leaving the institution (iv) the class studied at the time of leaving it, (v) the subjects or portion thereof studied while enrolled (vi) if it be the time of annual promotions, whether qualified for promotion to the next higher class, (vii) whether all due to that institution had been paid and (viii) reasons for leaving the institution. (b) Certificate of conduct (c) Medical certificate
- 3. Students who are selected for admission must produce two passport size photographs for the medical inspection form and for the purpose of identification.
- 4. No student who is granted admission shall claim a seat in the college unless the term fee is paid on the date mentioned in the admission slip. Students joining the college at the beginning of a term but withdrawing thereafter, will have to forfeit the fees paid.
- Any candidate who is found to have obtained admission by false representations shall be summarily dismissed with forfeiture of whatever fees he might have paid..
- 6. Any student who has paid all dues to the college is entitled to a Transfer Certificate at the end of the academic year if his progress and conduct have been satisfactory. No transfer certificate will be issued to a student who has not attended the classes on the first working day of any of the two terms, without their payment of the term fee.
- Students admitted into the college shall be required to undergo medical inspection within the first term of the first year degree course.

- 8. A fee of Rs. 500 will be charged for the issue of duplicate Transfer or Attendance or Medical Certificate and Rs. 50 will be charged for the issue of original Tranfer certificate
- 9. A student who leaves the college, without the permission of the Principal before completing the course, will receive no certificate of character, but the Principal may, if he is satisfied, transfer the student to another college or allow discontinuance of studies and give certificate of character, at such time as in his opinion may seem proper.
- 10. A student who leaves in the middle of a term cannot claim any part of the term fees.
- 11. The Principal may recommend poor students belonging to the Backward Classes, Scheduled Caste and Tribes for the benefit of fee concession, as per Government notifications, if he is satisfied that the concessions are required or deserved.
- 12. The scholarship if granted, is tenable for one academic year and is conditional upon good behaviour and satisfactory progress in studies. The Trust have the right of suspending or withdrawing the scholarship at any time with out assigning

reasons.

The State and Central Government offer the following scholarships to the students of Under Graduate classes.

# (a) GOVERNMENT OF INDIA SCHOLARSHIP:

Students belonging to the Scheduled Caste (should be HINDUS) can apply for this scholarship. Income of the Parents of those students who apply for concession should not exceed Rs. 12,000/-per annum. These students are also eligible for loan / scholarship from the Harijan Welfare Department.

## (b) STATE GOVERNMENT SCHOLARSHIP:

(for Backward Classes)

Students who have obtained 40% of the marks (in aggregate) in the last examination and whose parents income does not

exceed Rs. 5.000/-

## (c) STATE GOVERNMENT SCHOLARSHIP:

(for Adi Dravidas)

Adi Dravidas, whether Hindus or Christian converts are eligible to apply for this scholarship.

#### (d) SCHOLARSHIP UNDER 92 T.N.E.R.:

Students belonging to Backward Classes and whose parents'income does not exceed Rs. 1,500/-per annum can get half fee concession. Most Backward class students can enjoy full fee concession. Scheduled Caste students whose parents income does not exceed Rs. 5000/- per annum, are eligible to apply for full concession

(e) Educational concession are given to students whose parents have been or are serving in the defence services and those who are dependents of army men

### (f) WELFARE SCHEME IMPLEMENTATION:

The Government of Tamil Nadu has issued instructions to the Principals of all Colleges to implement the scheme of free education upto Degree level to the students belonging to Most Backward Classes and De notified Communities from the year 1939 onwards. Accordingly the Principals shall admit Most Backward Classes / Denotified Community; students pursuing three years Arts and Science Degree courses without insisting on payment of fees during their admission if they produce Community Certificate / transfer Certificate (Ref: Proceedings of the Director of Collegiate Education, Madras-600006. Rc No. 286699/01/90 dt. 11-04-90) Students who have obtained 60% in the examination and whose parents' income does not exceed Rs.6000/- per annum are eligible to apply for this concession. Those who apply for the loan of the scholarship should not apply for any other

# (g) SCHOLARSHIP FOR THE PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED:

Blind, deaf and physically deformed students whose parents' income does not exceed Rs.500/- per month are eligible to

for this scholarship. They should have scored at least 40% in the last examination passed and should be in the age group of 16-26

#### (h) DIRECTORATE OF COLLEGIATE EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIP

Parents' income should not exceed Rs. 3000/- per annum Students who apply for this scholarship are not eligible to apply for any other scholarships.

#### (i) PACHAIYAPPA'S TRUST SCHOLARSHIPS:

# 20. WELFARE

As per the direction of the Directorate of Collegiate Education, a Welfare Committee has been formed. The Regional Deputy Director will be the Convenor of the committee and Principal will be the Secretary. There are three Welfare Committees in the college, one for the teaching staff, one for the non-teaching staff and one for the students. The Committee will consist of three teacher representatives, three non-teaching staff, three students and two parents one from the University and one from the Management.

Problems of teachers, non-teaching staff and students will be taken up by this committee and decisions will be taken after deliberation.

# 21. TUTORIAL

Each teacher will be in-charge of 15 students. Students will seek counsel from the teachers concerned to solve all their problems in connection with their studies, games, entertainments, etc.

# 22. RULES OF

- No student will be allowed to absent himself from the college without leave.
- Leave for full day, if necessary will be granted only when an application for leave stating the reasons is submitted to the Principal, signed not only by the student but also by his father or guardian

- In case of illness extending to more than three days the student has to produce a medical certificate to the Principal compulsorily.
- 4. A student who absents himself from the class during any hour of the day without leave will be considered as having been absent for half-a- day and shall lose one day attendance. He is also liable to be fined.
- A student who absents himself without leave partially or completely during both the first and the second sessions of a day will be considered to have been absent for the whole day and lose two days attendance and shall also be liable to be fined.
- 6. Students who attend the class during the first hour, if they have to leave their class during the subsequent hour or hours for valid reasons should in person obtain the permission of the teachers concerned in written applications for leave. Otherwise, their absence will be treated as truancy.
- Absence during the entire second session will be permitted only by the Principal under unavoidable circumstances to be explained in person and in writing to him. Students who violate the rules will be fined.
- If a student is continuously absent for five working days without leave, his name will be struck off from the rolls unless the Principal is satisfied that the failure to obtain leave was unavoidable.
- 9. Attendance will be taken during every hour of the work. Students coming late will be fined.
- 10. The annual certificate of attendance required for admission to the University examination will in no case be granted unless (i) the student's progress and conduct has been satisfactory and (ii) the student has attended three fourth of the number of working days in the academic year.
- 11. Physical training is compulsory for all students in the first year of the degree classes and rules of attendance given above will apply to all the physical training classes too.

#### 23. CONDUCT OF

- Every student shall wear clean and suitable clothing that would mark him as a cultured person
- 2. Every student shall salute the Professors on the occasion of his first meeting for the day within the college premises
- When any offical authority visits the college, the students at work in any class room shall stand up as soon as he or she enters it.
- 4. When the Professor of the hour enters the class-room the student shall stand, and remain standing till they are desired to sit or the Professor takes his seat.
- 5 No student, shall leave the class room without the permission of the member-in-charge of the class or until the class is dismissed.
- 6. Students who have no classes to attend during any particular hour on a working day, shall go to the reading room.
- 7. Students shall not take part in any agitation directed against the authority or Government or engage themselves prominently in any public movement with which it is undesirable that persons in statue pupillary should be associated with.
- 8. In regard to all matters not specified in the above rules students shall aim at conducting themselves in good manner thoroughly worthy of the alumni of the college and of the University and in harmony with the best traditions of our life and culture.
- Cases of improper behaviour or default in the matter of payment of college fees or fines will be dealt with such disciplinary action as the Principal may deem fit.
- 10. The Principal may frame and issue from time to time, disciplinary rules of a permanent or temporary character regulating the conduct both inside and outside the college precincts of students on the rolls that might seem necessary to maintain the integrity and reputation of the college.
- 11. The Principal shall have full powers to inflict the following punishments in the interests of the students of the institution : Fines, loss at attendance, loss of term certificate, suspension

# 24. RESIDENTIAL

- Students of the college shall fill up the by-law forms required under University regulations within five days after admission or rejoining the college. Any changes in student's addresses should be promptly reported to the college office.
- 2. All students should furnish the fact that they live with their parents or bonafide guardians.

# 25. RULES FOR ISSUE OF RAILWAY

- All students of not more 24 years age are eligible for railway travel concession.
- 2. Students should apply for season ticket concession certificates in the prescribed form atleast two days in advance.
- 3. All the columns in the application form should be filled in properly.
- 4. Incomplete applications will not be considered.
- 5. When the certificate is issued, the students should make a note of the number and date of the certificate and should furnish those particulars in their subsequent applications. The certificate will be issued ordinarily between 12 noon and 1-30 p.m. on working days.
- Students travelling without tickets or misusing the season tickets or giving room for complaint by the railway authorities and bringing discredit to the college will be severely dealt with

# **26. THE LIBRARY**

- All students of the college are members of the College Library by virtue of the library fee they pay along with their college fees.
- Each student can borrow one book at a time. Students will be entitled to the rules below to keep the book borrowed for two weeks from

- the date of issue. It should be returned on or before the due date specified on the due date slip. But it may be re-issued to the same person, if it is not in the meantime applied by others.
- Re-issued book may be retained for a further period of two weeks, and not more than three. Such renewals will be allowed. The book should be produced before the Librarian for every renewal.
- 4. The Librarian may recall any book at any time, even if the normal period of borrow has not expired.
- Dictionaries, Reference books which might be difficult to be replaced will not be lent out.
- A student failing to return a book on the due date will be fined ten rupees for each day the book is delayed, Sundays and other holidays are excluded.
- 7. A student who has to pay a fine or any other charge to the library will not be allowed to borrow books. Absence from college will not ordinarily be admitted as an excuse for delay in the return of books. The Librarian shall send to the Principal every Monday evening the names of students who have to be fined for delay in returning the books.
- Students are expected to use all books with care. If a book is lost or damaged, the student responsible for it shall replace the book or pay the cost of the book to purchase a new copy.
- All markings, underlining or annotation of books, whether already soiled or not, is forbidden. Every book will be examined as soon as it is returned and, if any book is found to have been marked, soiled or damaged, it will be reported to the Principal for disciplinary action.
- 10. The student shall be held responsible for all defects in the book if he does not point out at the time of borrowing.
- 11. All payments including fines shall be paid to the college office and the receipt must be shown to the librarian.

- 12. The library will be opened during the working days of the college from 9-30 a.m. to 4-30 p.m.
- 13. Books will be issued between 11-00 a.m. and 1-30 p m. on all working days.
- 14. Every student who wishes to take a book, shall fill in the application form and present it at the issue counter before 10 a.m. When returning the book the borrower must take back the form, otherwise, he will be held responsible for the book.
- 15. Books must be returned before 10 a.m. on the day when the library is kept opened. The dates on which the library will be kept opened during vacation will be announced before each vacation. Strict silence and decorum must be observed in the library. The librarian may refuse to issue books for breach of the rule.
- 16. The librarian shall bring to the notice of the Principal any student who might disturb the congenial atmosphere of the library and also those who damage or loose the books.
- 17. A student who takes out a book for consultation shall apply for it as prescribed in Rule No. 16, and shall return it to the librarian before he leaves the hall, and in no circum stances transfer it to another person.
- 18. All complaints and suggestions should in the first instance, be made to the librarian, who will refer them to the Principal whenever necessary.
